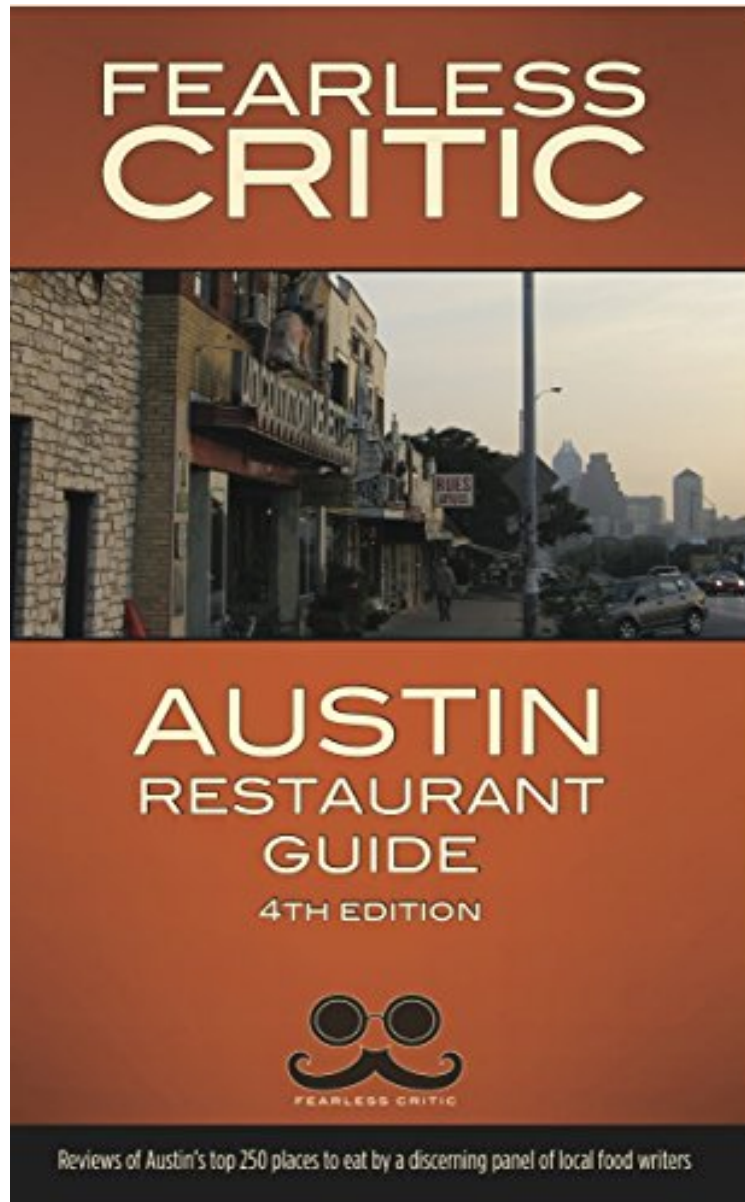

I'd also recommend their other book, "The Wine Trials". These same authors did blind taste tests with 507 testers in a variety of cities, testing wines that ranged in price from under \$10 to over \$200. They then tabulated the results and published a list of cheap wines that beat the big boys. VERY INFORMATIVE.
